Recently I went with the Road Scholar program to the Barrier Islands off the coast of Georgia, USA, to learn about local ecology and lighthouses. Before leaving I bought a new Yaesu 60R dual band handheld so I could have some QSO's. George GOM provided information about lighthouse repeaters. Then Glen GWN used his computer to program my 60R and gave advice on its usage. I now felt prepared to give Canadian presence on 2m and 70cm down South.

I flew to Chicago then Jacksonville, Florida, where I overnighted. There I tried to reach a Winnipeg pal. Darn! Wrong number and he wasn't listed. Next day I took a limo to St. Simons Island, Georgia to the Methodist Epworth Centre for the program. I enjoyed great accommodations and food; lively, informed presenters. Turned out I was the only Canadian, perhaps a novelty, among 28 "over 55" participants.

Tried my handheld from my second floor room, a shrimp boat, interisland ferry, on an island and part way up a lighthouse staircase.



My first contact was Jeff -----, who runs the N4XGI repeater on the very large and beautiful Sidney Lanier Bridge. Jeff is with the Coast Guard Auxiliary, which maintains the St. Simons Lighthouse still operational in the busy port of Brunswick, GA. Tuned in one eve on the KG4PXG repeater just as their net was ending. Missed everyone. One night I broke into a QSO; everyone was quite courteous and welcoming, but I felt uncomfortable interrupting so I bid 73. All other attempts to make contact were fruitless. Overall I was quite disappointed with the lack of QSO's; almost as bad as when no one noticed my new hairdo!

Canadian Amateur Radio Advisory Board
Meeting October 28, 2010 - 2010-10-29

The 35th meeting of the Canadian Amateur Radio Advisory Board [CARAB] took place on Thursday Oct. 28th. CARAB is composed of representatives from both Radio Amateurs of Canada [RAC] representing Canadian Amateurs, and Industry Canada, as the regulator of amateur radio.

The Chair of the Board rotates between the two organizations and this meeting was chaired by the President of RAC, Mr. Geoffrey Bawden, VE4BAW. The principle IC representative was Mr. Peter Hill, Senior Director, Spectrum Management Operations. IC was also represented by Ren\351 Guerrette, Co-Director, Amateur Radio Service, Gilles Rathier, Manager, Operational Policies and Joanne Poulin, Technical Policy

Analyst. Contributing from RAC were: J. T. [Mitch] Mitchell, VE6OH, Director for Alberta, NWT and Nunavut, Richard Ferch, VE3KI, Vice President Regulatory Affairs, and Norm Rashleigh, VE3LC, Vice President Industrial Liason.

At the CARAB meeting it was agreed to modernize and improve communication between the regulator and Canadian amateurs as represented by RAC. The value of CARAB as a consultative body between RAC and IC was reaffirmed by both parties and the Terms of Reference were updated.

Among key issues discussed at the meeting was IC's policy regarding temporary authorization of frequency assignments in amateur bands to non-amateur services [e.g. September 10th and 12th Pro Tour race in Quebec].

RAC impressed upon the IC officials that RAC, on behalf of Canadian amateurs, objected to intrusion into amateur bands by non-amateur services, especially for non-emergency purposes. IC noted the objection, committed to improve coordination and cooperation and advised that they were sensitive to RAC's concerns.

IC committed to continue to work with RAC on our request for allocation[s] in the 60M band which mirror those available to US amateurs. RAC emphasized the importance of this request to Canadian amateurs.

IC briefed RAC officials on the status of the web access project designed to allow amateurs direct access to the IC callsign and certificate database thus allowing such activities as applications for callsigns, and change of address. It is anticipated that the system will be live no later than Nov., 2011. Articles on the new system will be published in upcoming TCA's. IC asked RAC to serve as "acceptance testers" to help the developers ensure that the system would work as designed.

IC and RAC discussed the positive role that amateur radio played in emergency situations and IC noted that there would be value in more cooperation and planning between IC and RAC in this area. Follow-up meetings between RAC and IC will be arranged over the coming months. RAC is already linked with the ARRL and the US regulator [FCC] on emergency issues and welcomes this initiative of IC.

The next meeting of CARAB is anticipated for next April, concurrent with the RAC Board meeting.

D-Star Update

The Woodsworth Building in downtown Winnipeg was a busy place on Saturday October 30th, as work began on the installation of the D-Star repeater system.

For those of you not familiar with this location, the Woodsworth Building is a Provincial Government Building located downtown Winnipeg at the intersection of Broadway and Kennedy Street. It is also the location of the offices for Manitoba Emergency Measures Organization, with whom ARES works very closely with.

Through the afternoon, the organized work party had made a significant dent in the “to do” list, but there is a few more work sessions and several hours of effort to get things on the air. Participants in the afternoon of effort were Jeff VE4MBQ - Manitoba ARES District Emergency Coordinator – Capital Region, Wayne VE4WR - Manitoba ARES District Emergency Coordinator – Northern Region, Gord VE4GLS - Manitoba ARES District Emergency Coordinator – Southeast Region, Jan VE4JS - RAC Section Manager - Manitoba, Don VE4DJ – Manitoba Emergency Measures Organization, and Don VE4DWG - Manitoba ARES Section Emergency Coordinator. Thanks for all of their efforts and sweat equity in this project!

The afternoon began with the move of the 6 ½ foot tall computer equipment rack off of the truck and down Kennedy street sidewalk to the front door of the Woodsworth Building – that large object got a few stares from people on the street. Also arriving that afternoon was a large 12 volt battery for the repeater equipment, a large “APC” brand UPS system for the Gateway server that will connect the D-Star system to the internet, along with the triplexer, antenna and antenna support structure.

Once these components were up to the highest floor accessible by elevator, there was the part of the day that every repeater install volunteer dreads – the move of the equipment up the four flights of stairs to get to the roof level. Okay, that wasn't too bad – at least it

was warm and dry.

As the “ICOM” boxes were safely stored away in the Manitoba EMO offices awaiting our arrival, next came the move of these 4 large repeater boxes and the slightly smaller repeater controller to the roof level and a massive unpacking assembly line was formed. While this was underway the antenna and support structure were laid out and readied for installation. That part was perhaps not so warm as the inside work, but Wayne didn't look too cold when he came back in.

By the end of the afternoon we have the antenna support structure in place and the antenna mounted.

We have a server rack in place, and installed in it are the four D-Star repeaters and D-Star Controller, a 1500VA “APC” brand UPS, a West Mountain Radio PWR-gate power supply, 12 back-up battery and a 23cm Duplexer.

With upcoming sessions, we will build and install the coax jumper between the various devices, connect the feed line to the triplexer etc. The repeaters and controller will be configured, and the gateway computer will be set up and connected to the controller. As individual bands are ready to go and are fully configured, they will be turned on.

We will also eventually have a connection to the internet, so once that service is connected, that will connect via a router and then tie in to the gateway server allowing wide area connections for voice and data. Of note – there is a Friday evening “cross Canada” D-Star net – hopefully within a few more weeks many of you will be checking in on it!

The system is connected to the building's emergency generator system, so it will run through major power disruptions. With our addition of a UPS system to protect the computer equipment and the battery system and PWR-gate device for the repeaters themselves, there won't even be a drop out during the 15 second start up sequence of the emergency generator.

Finally, as indicated previously – once the system is up and running with its various features, we will be running a number of “D-Star University” sessions. These sessions will be in small groups and give you practical “how-to” info on the use of the system and include hands-on. Once these are in place, session dates will be distributed to all WARC members.

The SHARP balloon launched on time at 10:00 a.m. local from Erickson airport with a video camera, APRS beacon and cutdown timer on board. As this was their first attempt to do a near-space balloon there were no science payloads. The video camera was facing the horizon. The cutdown timer failed to release the payload and parachute at the scheduled time 11:45 a.m. local however the balloon burst about 5 minutes later at over 100k feet. The payload was successfully recovered between the Starbuck tower and Springstein, about 100 meters off a section road in a nicely plowed field. A dry field too.
