Radio Sport Manitoba Operating Award

Purpose: To recognize and encourage all Manitoba amateur radio operators in the hobby of DX'ing excellence.

Activity period: The RSM DX Marathon is a year-long activity, beginning at 0000 UTC January 1 and ending at 2359 UTC December 31. Each year's event is separate.

Frequencies: Any authorized amateur frequency may be used. Contacts through repeaters or satellites are not allowed for credit, nor are contacts with maritime or aeronautical mobile stations. All contacts must be made entirely over amateur radio frequencies – i.e., Echolink-type contacts do not count.

Eligibility: All licensed Amateurs residing in Manitoba

Modes: Any authorized amateur mode may be used, but three modes will be recognized in the DX Marathon – CW, PHONE and Digital. Except for single mode submissions, cross-mode QSO's are permitted but the mode used by the DX station must be shown in the submission.

General: Each entrant in the DX Marathon may submit one log for each of the three categories year. Entries with two or more call signs will count as a single entry only if all contacts were made by the same (single) operator. Each entrant may operate from one or more locations provided all operations are within Manitoba. Contacts made from portable or mobile stations are valid, provided they were made from Manitoba. Remote operation is permitted if all transmitters, receivers, and antennas are at a single physical location and within the province of Manitoba. Continued

Categories

There are three entry classes, "HF-Unlimited" "HF-Limited" and "VHF"

HF-Unlimited: An entrant may use any mode or power as prescribed by their license to make contact on any HF band below 30 MHz. Use of spotting nets, DX clusters, schedules etc. are permitted.

HF-Limited: An entrant may use any mode as prescribed by their license to make contact on any HF band below 30 MHz. However, to qualify for the limited category, all contacts must be made with 150W or less. Use of spotting nets, DX clusters, schedules etc. are permitted.

VHF: An entrant may use any mode or power as prescribed by their license to make contact on any amateur band above 50 MHz. Use of spotting nets, DX clusters, schedules etc. are permitted.

Scoring

For the HF Limited and HF Unlimited categories, each DXCC country worked is worth one point. Each CQ zone worked is worth one point. The total score is the sum of zones and countries worked, on any mode and any authorized band. There are no multipliers of any kind. Each country and zone count only once. A single QSO may count for both a country and a zone. If over the year you work 238 countries and 37 zones, your score is 275. If you work all 40 zones and 150 countries, your score is 190. The CQ DX Countries List and the CQ Zone List constitute the official lists.

For the VHF category, each 4-character maiden-head grid square worked is worth one point.

In the case of ties, the operator whose last scoring contact was earlier chronologically will be judged the winner. Decisions of the Marathon Manager are final.

Submissions

Submissions must be made electronically using ADIF files. Alternatively, submissions may be made using a Microsoft Excel® template into which contacts may be entered. All scores must be received by February 28.

Verification: QSLs are not required. The operator is expected to claim contacts only from stations the operator has every reason to believe are legitimate, and only to claim contacts in which an accurate two-way exchange was clearly accomplished (see Appendix for further explanation). Scores will be adjusted by the Manager for claimed contacts with pirates or any station not considered legitimate. Submissions may be penalized or voided in cases of fraud or poor sportsmanship. Every QSO may be subject to verification by the Manager. Decisions of the Manager are final.

Results: The final listing of official scores and winners will be sent to all entrants via email and published on the RSM website.

Awards Certificates will be awarded for the top entrants

in each of the following 9 categories...

HF-Unlimited – Mixed Mode, CW, PHONE, DIGITAL

Confessions of a Casual Contester #9 From the shack of DavidVE4DL

I am not now, nor ever have been, a Contester. I don't see myself becoming a Contester either, if one defines the term to include round-the-clock operations, intravenous fluids and diapers, and frequent relays of cold, one-hand meals. Not my thing, at all. BUT.....

November is in the history books. I worked WAE RTTY, but not much results. I don't know if it's because nobody is doing radioteletype anymore, or conditions locally were poor, but I had only North American QSOs, and not many of them. I still enjoy RTTY for the challenge, it's not the sure decode of some other famous modes I use, so the mental test is there, pulling real information out of the nonsense decodes. I kinda hope it makes a resurgence with Solar Cycle 25. Just as I wish I had an ACR teletype to work it with.....(god, I'm old.)

I worked ARRL November Sweepstakes, both CW and SSB. Not really active, nothing thrilling to report on either.

I put in 12½ hours on the CQ WW CW contest, one of the real biggies. I didn't score high, because I chose not to work most Americans (it's only 3 of the 30-odd zones possible) and concentrated on DX for 81 QSOs and 29 Zones in 31 Countries. I'm good with that. I had a number of first-time countries, too: Latvia, Finland, Sweden, Madeira, Cayman Is., Grenada. I picked up Greenland – town of Nuun. Looks like about six houses and a ham. He'll get a card.

And my last contact of the weekend – VK4JU in Cairns, Queensland, Australia! Australia is a first-time to amaze and astound the masses. Literally half-way around the world from me. Got him on 15m in late afternoon Central time (about grey-line here) after a 15 min struggle. Saw him spotted and tuned there, almost tuned away from all the QRN, but he was there, fading in and out. Took many CQs to be sure of his call, then the signal strengthened and I started sending my call – about a dozen reps before he noticed me. A few more reps for him to be sure of my call, then the exchange four times. It was great for me, I hope it was good for him, too. He'll get a card for sure. I danced around the shack after that, and shut down. How could I top Australia on 15m?

I did have some Americans asking where all the NU, NT and YT ops were? I couldn't answer that, but I didn't get them either. A VO1 was on, but shut down just as I started calling him. No joy there.

That's six contests in the books using N3FJP's logging software. I really like it a lot. I will keep N1MM+ in reserve, for contests not covered by ACLog modules. I do find the ACLog contest loggers to be much simpler to set up and use, and WAY simpler to upload the results afterwards. The bandscope is a little clunkier, and some bells and whistles aren't there, but I don't really need them.

I finally got around to trying the Bureau method of QSLing. I've been using electronic of course, and sending real cards to milestone contacts by regular post, but I decided \$1.39 each was getting stiff. Sent a few bucks to the VE4 Incoming Bureau – a week later I get 4 cards from 2018! Howzzat? I'm looking into sending by the Outgoing Bureau, it's a little more complex, but I'll work it out. These 4 guys have been waiting a couple of years for a reply, and the Greenland and Australia mentioned above. It is not as immediate as eQSL or LoTW, but a lot of hams spent good money on printing interesting cards, it's nice to collect a few. I'm ashamed of my homebrew card now, maybe I'll order some better ones.....

But it isn't contesting. Nope. Not at all.

Some Thoughts On Ham Radio Operation by Gerry VE4GKS

With COVID time on my hands, I have been doing some badly-needed computer work. One of the projects has been setting up one of my systems as a dedicated ham radio machine. As I have lots of choices, I chose a Lenovo T410. It has the port replicator, so I have lots (10) of USB ports, full RAM (8Gb) & a ½ terabyte SSD. The clock, of course, keeps UTC. The O/S is "Windoze" 10 Pro.

The software load depends on just what you intend to do. A few interesting web sites are:

This site shows near real-time (a few seconds after a stroke) where there is lightning activity in the world. It might also provide a bit of a warning of possible local activity, or areas which are experiencing a lot of static and poor local operating conditions.

KG0ZZ has some interesting antenna designs. One is a dual-band (2 meter & 70 centimeter) beam that appears very easy and inexpensive. It is a dual-band yagi

with a wood boom, and need no metalworking tools or skill. Nor does it need a diplexer.

Two interesting satellite tracking programs are "Orbitron" by Sebastian Stoff, and "Gpredict". Download either one of these by entering the program name into Bing, and letting it find the file. With Orbitron enter Sebastian's name along with the program. With Gpredict, just enter the program name. The downloads are .ZIP files.

Orbitron installs just as you would expect for a Windows program.

Gpredict installation is a bit unusual. Unzip the download into your C:\program files\ directory. It will unzip to about 725 files in multiple subdirectories. There is over 47 million bytes. One you have done this, navigate down to the 1st level of files. There will be two .EXE file of about 630,000 bytes, and about 40 .DLL files. The one you want to execute is GPREDICT-CON.EXE. It is the larger of the two files. Create a shortcut to this file and place it on the desktop. This package doesn't require any entries in the registry. If you want to delete it, just delete the shortcut and the subdirectory in \program files.

Alex Shovkopyas VE3NEA has some interesting software, not all of it free, although you can download it and run on a limited trial basis. HAMCAP is a propagation predictor, using the Voice of America analysis engine. You have to download and install the engine (typical Windows procedure). This one is free, although it works better with DXATLAS (not free), as the latter gives a bigger map display. Look for "Afrete Software" with your search engine.
